Tiger Salamander

Ambystoma tigrinum

The warm season in Iowa brings out all kinds of interesting animals, including the Eastern tiger salamander. These amazing amphibians are the largest land-dwelling salamander in North America and they can be found along the East Coast and into the Midwest.

The life cycle of Eastern tiger salamanders are fascinating. A female salamander can produce up to 1000 eggs per season, laying them in clusters of 10-100 in a pond or wetland. Once the eggs hatch, salamander larvae emerge into the water where they hunt and feed on aquatic invertebrates.



Did you know?

After 2.5-5 months, larvae go through metamorphosis where biological changes occur to make the switch from an aquatic lifestyle to a terrestrial one. However, some adult tiger salamanders can stay in the aquatic stage for their whole lives.

Tiger salamanders can be hard to find because they are burrowing animals. Although tiger salamanders seem rare, their populations in lowa are stable. However, they can be sensitive to environmental changes. Their skin makes them vulnerable to chemicals in their habitats. Wetland destruction also negatively effects salamanders because they need water to complete their life cycle. Keep an eye out this summer and if you're lucky, you might just spot a tiger salamander somewhere dark and damp!

More exciting improvements are underway at Wilkinson Pioneer Park in Rock Falls! Following recent upgrades to the campground electrical service, the new online campsite registration system, and shelter & shower house improvements, the Cerro Gordo County Conservation (CGCC) staff continues to work towards improving the user experience at the park.

This summer we are focusing on road resurfacing from the park entrance to the covered bridge and improving the fishery in the Wilkinson Park pond. The chip-sealed road surface will be ground up and top



dressed with a layer of roadstone which will allow for easier continued maintenance for CGCC staff. The pond is scheduled to be renovated with a partial draining, replacement of the overflow structure, and minor dike modifications. These pond improvements should add an additional 2-3 feet of water depth and increase the ability of the pond to support a more sustainable fishery. This project is a great example of how your contributions as a licensed angler make a difference. \$3 of every lowa fishing license purchased goes toward the lowa DNR Fish Habitat Grant Program. These funds are earmarked for projects that improve public fisheries. CGCC applied for and was awarded a grant

that will fund 90% of the Wilkinson pond project.

As these projects get underway this summer, we ask for your patience while contractors and staff are working in the park. Some temporary road closures may occur to facilitate the improvements.



County Parks and Natural Areas Bluebill Wildlife Area

One of the counties hidden secret fishing spots, this 40-acre lake is stocked with bass, bluegill, crappie, and catfish. Bluebill Wildlife Area was purchased from the Iowa DOT in 2002 . A 62-acre park along the north side of the Avenue of the Saints provides for many outdoor recreational opportunities. Boating, fishing, and hunting are popular activities at Blue-bill. A dock and boat ramp provide easy access to the water along with two jetties and a kayak launch. A picnic shelter and table allow for a break from the sun during a full day on and around the water.


